Children will also have a blast participating in the coin hunt and relay races. During the coin hunt at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, youths will have the opportunity to find \$300 in coins that will be hidden in hay bales. Take a photographic tour of MISSION'S CHU

With Mother Nature's blessing, it's time to dust off the garden gloves, knock the cobwebs off the tools and beautify our outdoor spaces. There are plenty of places to become inspired, gardenwise, in Mission. If you are looking for some good tips and maybe even some divine inspiration for your own garden, check out the gardens that are carefully tended outside the city's churches. Vol-

unteers are often the ones who are called to create and maintain these serene and lush settings. In Mission, the result is a great variety — and grand beauty — at Countryside Christian Church, St. Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church, St. Pius X Catholic Church and Trinity Lutheran Church.

Community Garden at St. Pius X Catholic Church, 5500 Woodson

Families that don't have the proper space and the right growing conditions in their own yards have discovered the perfect place to grow vegetables and flowers: the St. Pius X Community Garden. This year will be the sixth year for the community garden, which started with 20 plots. The garden has grown to 49 10-by-10 squares that are lovingly cared for by area residents who share their tips with their fellow gardeners and their excess produce with each other and church members. There is always a waiting list to get a plot.

"It's been a really neat community-building project for our parish," said Kevin Smith, groundskeeper for St. Pius X. "We're a very green parish."

"Community" is truly the central theme of this garden. People

who normally may not know each other have bonded through their sharing of growing success (and not-so-successful) stories, their talk of rain (or the lack thereof) and their tips for improving their yields of tasty produce and gorgeous flowers in the future.

It's also a garden that spans generations with children and grandchildren working alongside parents and grandparents.

"Alena loves vegetables so it's great to plant it, eat it and see where it comes from," said MaryEllen Gillespie, of her daughter.

The Gillespies' harvests have included green beans, spinach, onions, cucumbers, eggplants, tomatoes, peppers and Brussels sprouts.

"The vegetables are good," Alena said last summer as she was eating a cherry tomato.







Children's Garden, 'scattering garden' and more at St. Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church, 6630 Nall Ave.

If you walk all the way around the exterior of St. Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church, you will see the work of the Gardening Angels just about everywhere. The Gardening Angels, a group of volunteers at the church, meet on the second Saturday of each month (except in the wintertime) and diligently work to beautify the church's garden beds. Many photographers use St. Michael's grounds as the backdrop for their pictures, and there are benches in several spots where visitors can sit and relax.


"For a newcomer, it's a great way to learn about Midwest gardening," said Kathy Minges, of her experience as a member of the Gardening Angels, "and it's a great way to meet like-minded people."

On the sunny west side of St. Michael and All Angels, the Gardening Angels have created an area for kids. The children's garden is a cheery oasis where kids can feel the softness of the lamb's ear plants; view colorful plants and flowers; smell the aroma of thyme, rosemary and other herbs in the kitchen garden; and even bury their small pets, like hamsters, gerbils and lizards.

The church also has a "scattering garden" for parishioners' ashes, which has been expanded since being created in 1989.

Adjacent to the scattering garden on the east side of the church is a "quiet garden" that is part of the international "Quiet Garden Movement."

Disciples Garden at Countryside Christian Church, 6101 Wall Gve.

If you are looking for a place to get away from the hustle and bustle of everyday life, the solution is just off Shawnee Mission Parkway on Nall Avenue. Volunteers at Countryside Christian Church have made its Disciples Garden a peaceful retreat where people can slow down and take a break. Employees from nearby offices and residents from Bickford at Mission Springs come to the garden to eat lunch and meditate.

"We've tried to make it a garden for everyone," said Linda McConwell, who has helped with the garden. "...We want people to use the garden and have gatherings out here."

To get ideas for its Disciples Garden, which was dedicated in 2002, Countryside Christian volunteers toured other church gardens in the area.

Even though the garden is in a relatively busy part of town, you forget about all that when you are enjoying its year-round beauty, from tulips and crocuses in the spring to colorful trees and mums in the fall. As you are walking through the Disciples Garden, be sure to look down and see the names of members and former members of the church on engraved bricks, which were sold to help pay for the garden.







Prayer request box and rose garden at Trinity Lutheran Church, 5601 W. 62nd St.

Do you want to slip a prayer request into the box at Trinity Lutheran Church? All you have to do is look for the beautiful rose bushes in the center island in front of the church's main entrance. More than 30 single knockout rose bushes put on a beautiful display of red roses around the prayer request box.

"We moved it (the prayer request box) to the center island because we thought it was more attractive there and thought it might get more use," said Jean Schlesselman, who tended the gardens at Trinity Lutheran for 12 years. "...When the roses are blooming, people really enjoy them."

Members and non-members of the church can drive by and slip their prayer request into the box. The requests can be anonymous, and people are able to ask for prayers if they (or someone they know) is facing an illness, recovering from surgery, lost their job or is dealing with another difficulty.

MISSION AD AGENCY HAS A HAND IN ALEX GORDON'S BIG SLIDE

Kansas City Royals' preseason billboard garnered a lot of attention

Did you notice the Kansas City Royals' billboard on I-35 where outfielder Alex Gordon looks like he is sliding so hard he's pushing the vinyl right off the sign?

That billboard in downtown Kansas City, Mo., received a lot of national attention, but many people may not know it has a Mission connection.

Walz Tetrick Advertising, located in Mission on Shawnee Mission Parkway and Nall Avenue in the former NCAA building, is responsible for coming up with the concept. This preseason billboard, which was up for about four weeks in February and March, kicked off the Royals' "Be Royal" campaign. The Alex Gordon billboard for 2014 followed 2013's billboards where pitcher James Shields "threw the ball" from one side of I-35 to catcher Salvador Perez on another billboard on the other side of the highway. Again, it looked like the vinyl had been damaged, this time by the speed of Shields' pitch. The two-billboard set in 2013 earned Walz Tetrick recognition across the sports marketing and advertising industries, including the

How International Design Awards, American Advertising Federation Awards, Obie Awards and National Sports Forum Awards.

"We did this last year and got a lot of good response," said Amanda Coleman, a senior art director at Walz Tetrick Advertising. "Our client was looking for another big splash to launch this season's campaign."

This year's Alex Gordon billboard went viral nationally on social media. Photos were tweeted, posted to Facebook and featured online by ESPN, CBS, Buzzfeed, deadspin, Sports Illustrated, MSN and more.



Forever Young Childcare meets the needs of working parents

MISSION DAYCARE IS OPEN 24 HOURS A DAY, SEVEN DAYS A WEEK

Nina Parker wakes up two hours earlier than normal to drive her daughter from their home in the Midtown area of Kansas City, Mo., to Forever Young Childcare in Mission and back to her job at Truman Medical Center in downtown Kansas City.

But, for Parker and her 2-year-old daughter Jordyn, the drive is totally worth it.

"It's hard to find child care you can trust," Parker said. "...It's worth it to see my baby happy."

Besides being a nurturing and safe place for kids, Forever Young is a 24-hour childcare facility that is open seven days a week (as needed) with the exception of two Sundays a month. While there are some in-home daycares that provide flexible hours and/or a 24-hour option, there are hardly any childcare centers that are open around the clock, every day of the week. This makes life a lot easier for parents, like Parker, who have to be at work at

7 a.m. Many childcare facilities open at 7 a.m. and close promptly at 5:30 p.m., which makes it tough for working parents who don't have a 9-to-5 job.

This is exactly what MoNae White had in mind when she opened Forever Young Childcare in Mission at 5404 W. 58th Terrace.

White did her research in advance and could only find a few 24-hour childcare centers in the Greater Kansas City area and none in Northeast Johnson County or Midtown Kansas City, Mo.

White, who used to work three jobs herself (in the hospitality industry, at a daycare and in retail), understands the challenges of being a mom and working jobs on evenings and weekends. In addition, her two best friends are nurses who work 12-hour shifts. Taking your child to a daycare situation that only offers daytime and weekday care doesn't work for every parent.

"I wanted to be unique with the 24-hour care and the seven days a week," she said.

The weekend care at Forever Young is helpful for parents who work on Saturdays and Sundays or for those who need to take care of errands or holiday shopping.

For the Pollard kids, Forever Young is a great option since their parents work weekends.

"She is very patient and feeds them well," said their mom, Demeca Harris. "I don't have to worry about them while they are there."

White (or Miss MoNae as she is often called) is also unique in that she accepts infants, provides after-school care for school-aged children and offers drop-in care if parents call the day before. In all, the center can have 12 children from ages 6 weeks to 12 years old.

With the dream of opening this unique type of childcare center, White began searching online for a location. She found the building at 5404 W. 58th Terrace (a block north of Johnson Drive, just east of Nall Avenue) on Craigslist. She later found out that the building had been a daycare but had been vacant for a few years. She got the building in August 2012, received her daycare license in October 2012 and started caring for her first children in February 2013. Although the building had a nice backyard and good square footage, it needed a lot of TLC to get it ready for children.

Now it's a clean, bright and cozy atmosphere. The first things people notice when they walk in are the letter tree and rainbow painted on the walls and happy children busy at play.

A day at Forever Young includes healthy meals and snacks (with offerings such as ground turkey, fish, chicken, and fresh fruit and vegetables), singing, dancing, exercising, crafts and lots of playing.

During learning time, 3-, 4- and 5-year-olds work on their recognition of shapes, colors and letters.

White, mother of 2-year-old Dontae, strives to keep Forever Young feeling like home.

"I like to do it how I would want it done if I sent my son to daycare," she said. "...I totally love kids and I always have. It (opening a daycare) is something I always wanted to do. Children are my passion. I love their laughter because I love to laugh, too."

Forever Young Childcare is licensed through the Kansas Department of Health and Environment as a group daycare home. White said she and the other workers are CPR and first aid certified, take part in continuing education courses and have undergone KBI background checks.



INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE: A 'GAME CHANGER' FOR STUDENTS AT **SHAWNEE MISSION NORTH**

SMN is only one of eight high schools in Kansas to offer the JB program

When Darian Dozier was a freshman at Shawnee Mission North High School, she had a plan. She would take her most difficult classes as a sophomore so she could take it easy her senior year before going to college.

That plan changed along the way and now Darian, a senior at North, is on track to graduate with an International Baccalaureate (IB) diploma. She will be the first student to receive the IB

diploma at North and the only recipient in the 2014 class.

The International Baccalaureate program is an internationally recognized curriculum that offers 11th- and 12th-grade students an opportunity to study collegelevel curriculum and earn the IB diploma. Schools have to go through a long, arduous process to be certified as an IB school, including applications and an on-site visit. For North, the process took about two years and the school received its IB status in 2012. Only eight high schools in Kansas are IB certified, with three being in the Shawnee Mission School District (North, East and Northwest).

Many of the IB classes are two years in length, so Darian's senior year has been anything but relaxing. Over the course of the past two years, she has taken IB English, history of the Americas, psychology, chemistry, Spanish and math. She also has been required to write an extended essay of independent research guided by a faculty mentor; complete 150 hours of creative, action and service activities; and participate in a critical-thinking course called Theory of Knowledge.

"If you are going to go through something, you might as well go all the way," Darian said. "Go big or go home."

She plans to major in psychology (on a pre-med track), with minors in biology and Spanish, at either Creighton University or the University of Tulsa. Her IB diploma will earn her scholarship funding for about half the tuition at either school.

Chris Zuck, associate principal at Shawnee Mission North and the school's current IB coordinator, said the IB program is one vehicle that can open doors for students. With an IB diploma, students can leave high school with anywhere from 24 to 32 hours of college credit (depending on their IB test scores and where they go to college) at a significantly reduced cost. This enables them to

have double majors or start their work on master's degrees early.

"It (the IB program) is obviously a game changer when it comes to opportunities in college," he said. "...Colleges and universities like it because they know the students who have lived through that experience can handle the college experience."

Five juniors at North are working toward receiving IB diplomas next year. About 80 juniors and seniors take individual IB

classes "cafeteria-style" without earning the diploma.

Sarah Grandgenett, a senior at North, has taken IB history of the

Americas and English. She is now deciding between the University of Kansas and the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, where she has been offered \$54,000 in scholarship money because of taking IB courses and her well-rounded high school experience.

"I have passions for things, but I don't know where that will lead me," she said.

Sarah, who is planning to major in biology in college, plays viola, has been a member of the Shawnee Mis-

sion North varsity gymnastics and track teams, and works at Bob Evans restaurant — all while taking multiple IB and Advanced Placement (AP) courses at North.

The thrill of the hunt

Garage sale season is here, so get ready to stock up and unload

Get ready, buyers and sellers! Spring is here and the time is right to shop 'til you drop or shed some of your unwanted treasures — whichever state of mind you happen to be in.

The Mission City-Wide Garage Sale is being held on a new weekend this year (see box for more information) and at the same time as city-wide sales in nearby communities. It's a win-win for both garage sale vendors and shoppers. More people, more goodies ... let the shopping frenzy begin!

But first, here are some tips from Mission residents JoAnne Owens and Nancy Hansen. Owens recently held her first garage sale in Mission but has hosted many while living in Brookside and north of the river. Hansen and her husband Marc have been avid garage salers for 10 years.

If you are selling at a garage sale...

- Set up as many things as possible on your driveway instead of making people come to your garage. Owens recommends putting your best things out front and even setting up furniture so it looks like a room. Hansen said if she sees interesting things on the driveway, it's a sign there's more good merchandise to come.
- Make sure your merchandise is clean and organized. It also helps to set things up in "departments," like office, kitchen, etc.
- Price your merchandise with tags and be ready to negotiate.
- Sit close to the front so you can greet shoppers when they come in. "The day of the sale really is a lot of fun," Owens said.
- If you have more expensive things to sell, consider accepting credit cards, Hansen said. Companies like Square, for example, make it easy to take credit cards using your cell phone or iPad.

If you are buying at a garage sale...

- Hansen suggests that buyers take return address labels (with a phone number added) to garage sales. This is an easy way to give sellers your contact information if they decide they want to part with an unsold piece at a lower price later in the day.
- At neighborhood sales, Hansen recommends driving around to scope out the sales and then finding a central place to park.
- Never walk away from broken pieces. "Everything has potential," she said. Turn furniture over and open dresser drawers before buying.
- Don't shy away from buying rugs (even if they look like they've seen better days). Hansen said there are a couple companies in the area that hand wash rugs relatively inexpensively. Other things she likes looking for are clay pots, picture frames, lamps and outdoor furniture.
