A Loyal Following

With its neighborhood bar and grill feel, Salsa Grill has become a popular place to grab some Mexican food

Unlike many college freshmen, Jon Lomshek knew exactly what he wanted to major in and do for a living.

The plan for Lomshek, who earned his bachelor's degree in hotel and restaurant management from Kansas State University, was always to own a restaurant someday. What that restaurant would be exactly wasn't quite as clear. But, now, many in the area know what Salsa Grill — Lomshek's 13-year-old restaurant — is all about. They come for the good food and service, relaxed atmosphere and, of course, the salsa.

"We wanted to have a great salsa," he said. "In Italian, barbecue or any kind of food, if the sauce isn't good, the rest doesn't matter much."

The early days of Salsa Grill

When Salsa Grill, 6508 Martway, first opened in 2001 (two weeks after 9/11) it was a medium- to upper-scale Mexican restaurant. Employees wore collared shirts and khaki pants, the tables were adorned with cloth napkins, and the restaurant had a more formal feel.

After a year or so, that formula was not working.

"It was rough," Lomshek said. "We didn't hit the sales we were hoping for. We had to re-invent ourselves after two years.

"We tried to be way too formal in the early days. We have definitely made it more casual."

Salsa Grill has down-scaled its formality and become more fun and colorful ambiance-wise. And the employees have traded in their collared shirts and khaki pants for jeans and T-shirts. However, Salsa Grill has purposely avoided being the "stereotypical" Mexican restaurant.

"It still has the feel of a neighborhood bar and grill even though we serve Mexican food," he said. "Mission has become a restaurant mecca and every year there becomes more competition. Every year there's pressure to re-invent yourself."

Salsa and more

Once Lomshek decided to open a Mexican restaurant, salsa (as the restaurant's name would indicate) was always part of the game plan.

"I want people to say that it's the best salsa they ever had," he said. "We pride ourselves on our salsa."

Part of the restaurant's evolution has been the addition of a third salsa. Salsa Grill started with two: mild and hot. About five years ago, a medium salsa was added and is now the most popular.

The menu is also a blend of original and newer offerings. Salsa Grill added steak tacos about five years ago.

"They are probably our most popular, especially at lunch," he said.

Other favorites are the Monterrey Enchiladas (spicy shredded chicken wrapped in corn tortillas and smothered in the Monterrey cream cheese sauce) and an original from Day 1, the Salsa Grill Burrito (a large flour tortilla filled with refried beans, ground beef and pork, then smothered with chili con queso).

"With Mexican food, you have to be creative because you have eight or 10 ingredients you present in 50 or 60 ways," Lomshek said.

And sometimes it's tricky to get customers to try new things.

"So many of our customers have been coming here for years," he said. "When their feet hit the parking lot they know what they are going to get."

The backbone of the recipes

Jon Lomshek has known his wife Jamie and her family since he was in elementary school. Jamie's mom, Pat Forge, was a longtime Spanish teacher at his high school, Maur Hill Prep

in Atchison, Kansas. The cafeteria at the school was run by Catholic sisters from Mexico. Being the Spanish teacher, Forge would help them with their English. In exchange, the sisters taught Forge how to cook Mexican food.

Those recipes are the backbone for the food served at Salsa Grill, which is co-owned by Jon and

Loyal customers and employees

Salsa Grill has a very loyal following. Several customers have been coming to the restaurant for years if not over a decade. (See Page 10 about the water aerobics class that goes to Salsa Grill for Margarita Mondays,) It's a place where customers and employees — many of whom have worked there for more than five years and a couple for the duration — often know each other's names.

People flock to Salsa Grill for the daily specials, especially Taco Tuesday, which includes specials on tacos and domestic longneck bottles of beer. To give you an idea of its popularity, Taco Tuesdays are often busier than Friday nights.

"What I loved about Mission and still love about Mission are the independent businesses and the relationship they have with the community," Lomshek said.

And he is thankful to his regulars who have been so faithful and the new customers who continue to try it out.

For example, Nicki Hodges has taken her sons — Mak Booher, 21, and Tate Hodges, 8 — to Salsa Grill at least once a week since moving to Mission about a year ago. Nicki works nearby at Entercom and sometimes eats there for lunch as well.

Her family likes the food, environment and the fact that it's always quick.

Water aerobics and then ... Salsa Grill?

Class from the Sylvester Powell, Jr. Community Center makes Margarita Mondays a monthly event

The idea was proposed in a hot tub at the Sylvester Powell, Jr. Community Center. The evening water aerobics class had just wrapped up, and some of the participants were soaking in the hot tub. Willie McCallum and Tonya Navarrette were talking about going to Salsa Grill for the margarita special on that Monday night and invited others to go with them.

That was five years ago.

Since then, the evening water aerobics class has made it a ritual to go to Salsa Grill on the last Monday of every month. After they exercise at the Community Center from 5:35 to 6:30 p.m., they head down Martway to the Mexican restaurant.

"It's a fun way to get together," said Janet Moore, membership coordinator at the Sylvester Powell, Jr. Community Center and a participant in the class. "It's a social group."

The ladies — anywhere from 10 to 20 — go to Salsa Grill for the tasty food and fellowship. They talk about "anything and everything." Popular topics include their kids, grandchildren, vacations and "crazy relatives."

"What's said in Vegas stays in Vegas," said Jean Humphrey, from Overland Park.

Humphrey switched to the morning water aerobics class about four years ago but still comes to the Margarita Monday nights at Salsa Grill.

"They are a lot of fun," Humphrey said. "We accept each other for who we are. We just have a good time.

"These are my buddies."

Sherry Breiten, a Prairie Village resident, said one of the nice things about this group is that it includes people of all ages, ranging from the instructor in her 20s to class participants in their 80s. They celebrate birthdays and share their treats with their server.

"We have a lot of fun with the waiters and waitresses," Breiten said.

"When you come in here, they treat you very nice," added Pam Denny, of Mission.

Some of the women knew each other before water aerobics/ Margarita Mondays. But many have become friends because of it.

Grace Andrews, also a Mission resident, has been taking the evening water aerobics class two nights a week for 10 years.

She said she now does things with some of the other ladies outside of class and Margarita Mondays, like go to lunch and the movies.

"It's a good way to meet people and make new friends," she said.

Friendship is at the heart of what the Margarita Monday group is all about.

Janet Kurtz, of Roeland Park, goes to Margarita Mondays almost every month for the trio of good conversation, friends and food

And they have been there for each other through illnesses and death.

The group can get a little "loud and obnoxious" at Salsa Grill sometimes — but it's not margarita-related.

"Very few people drink margaritas," Janet Moore said. "We go for the social part of it and the good food."



Two families, one Outlook

The Legg family figures out how to stay in Mission and bring three generations closer

When you find out that Suzie Legg lives across the street from her in-laws, you might wonder if it's anything like an episode of "Everybody Loves Raymond." (It's not, by the way.)

The real story here, however, is how Suzie and her husband Kevin bought their starter home in Mission, loved the neighborhood so much they wanted to stay, and renovated their home to the point where they can raise their family. And then, several years later, they bought the house across the street, so Kevin's parents could live nearby.

This is the story of one family, two houses and one close-knit street.

LEGG HOUSE NO. 1

Many young Mission families find themselves in the Leggs' situation: They move to the city for various reasons, but they soon outgrow their home. And then what do you do?

"When we moved here, we came because of the location," Suzie said.

Kevin works in construction; Suzie is the elementary curriculum coordinator for the Kansas City Kansas

School District. Mission is a good middle ground.

"I can be anywhere in the metropolitan area in about 30 minutes," Kevin said.

When they moved into their home on Outlook in 1997, the house was pretty much in its original state. It was built in 1950 and looked like the home directly to its north. It was a 1 ½-story with an upstairs that could be used as a bedroom if you could navigate the slanted ceiling without bonking your head. There were two bedrooms and one bath on the main floor and a half bath in the basement. The house's galley-style kitchen still had its original Sears and Montgomery Ward appliances and metal cabinets and there was no shower in any of the bathrooms.

"Our original plan was fix it up, sell it, make some money and move south like everyone else," Kevin said.

But they had the extra benefit of their lot backing onto Waterworks Park, and they liked their street and neighbors. (They know just about everyone from 51st to 53rd streets.) In short, it was a situation they didn't want to leave. And then came the dilemma that many young couples face.

"If we have kids, we have to have a bigger house," Suzie said.

The Leggs didn't have any kids at the time. (They now have two daughters: Taylor, 7, and Peyton, 4.)

To solve this problem, the couple decided to add 12 feet onto the back of their house to accommodate a more modern eat-in kitchen with a center island. On the main level, they also added a bedroom and Jack-and-Jill bathroom that connected with one of the existing bedrooms. In addition, they expanded and renovated the second level

to create an office/library, master suite with a laundry area in the walk-in master closet, and fifth bedroom (currently being used as a playroom).

Besides the room additions, they updated the home's electrical system and plumbing, added insulation and constructed their dream "farmhouse-style" covered porch onto the front of their house that is 6 feet wide and 36 feet long.

Their little house is now a 3,500-square-foot, five-bedroom,

3 ½-bath home with a finished basement that has a family room, bar, half bath and the home's original laundry room.

"We made this house what we needed it to be," Suzie said. "...If you like it well enough, you will find a way to stay.

"...People have chosen to stay here (in Mission) and have done things to make it livable and work for them."

Kevin said the City of Mission is very cooperative in letting homeowners do the work as long as they get the proper permits.

"The city was flexible and let me design it myself," he said. "I didn't have to hire an architect. I just had to have the plans approved by the city and have the construction done to code."

"We created the house we wanted for a fraction of the cost (of a new home)," he added.

LEGG HOUSE NO. 2

Suzie and Kevin bought the two-bedroom, one-bath house across the street from theirs in October 2013.

They had had several conversations with Kevin's parents

— Kline and Connie Legg — about moving from Great
Bend, Kansas, to Kansas City.

"We had wanted to move for a long time since our kids live in the Kansas City area," Connie said. "...Kevin found us a house across the street so it was now or never."

Kevin's parents don't miss anything about Great Bend, where they lived for about 40 years. Everything they need is nearby, and the quality of health care is better here.

"Kevin is close by in case we have an emergency,"

Connie added.

Also, they had become acquainted with Mission when they visited Kevin and his family. They already knew people at their church, First Baptist of Mission, before moving.

Kevin and other family members prepared the house for his parents by renovating the kitchen and bathroom, installing new carpet and painting.

Connie picks up her granddaughter Taylor, a first-grader at Rushton Elementary School, on school days and watches her until Kevin gets off work.

"They help us out tremendously," said Suzie of her in-laws.

The arrangement allows the grandparents to see their son and granddaughters almost every day instead of just three or four times a year. Kevin sees his sisters and brother more as well. (Two of his siblings live in the Kansas City area and another sister lives in Topeka, Kansas.)

"We see family a lot more because they (his parents) are here," Kevin said. "It's a reason for them to come."

Meanwhile, Suzie's parents still live 250 miles away in Great Bend, Kansas. Kevin and Suzie are hoping with a little (or a lot) of convincing — and the right housing opportunity in their neighborhood — that Suzie's parents might move here someday, too.

"It's nice to have family close," she said.





Each year the City Council, with the assistance of City staff, works to prepare a budget that is:

- a spending guide reflecting the City's priorities
- a policy document allocating funds to specific services and programs
- a communication device to share these choices with residents
- an outline of anticipated revenues to support City services

Council will be addressing specific areas of the 2016 Budget at a variety of meetings over the coming months. The second of two public hearings on redistricting will be held at the May 20th City Council Meeting, and I encourage you to attend this meeting to share your views with Council.

In my last letter, I mentioned that we are working on a Farmers Market in Downtown Mission this summer. We are excited to announce that our Mission Farm & Flower Market will kickoff June 6th at the city-owned property west of Capitol Federal between Reeds and Maple Streets. There will be a variety


CHANGES TO WARDS 1 AND 2 RECOMMENDED IN REDISTRICTING PROCESS

"Redistricting" has become a familiar term to Mission residents over the past two years. It is important that all four of Mission's wards have resident populations that are substantially equal. Updating and adjusting our current ward boundaries to achieve this goal is not an easy task and several committees have worked diligently to find the best solution to this issue. Early this year, the 2015 Redistricting Committee met and unanimously recommended boundary changes to both Ward 1 and Ward 2. These recommended changes were presented to Council in March, and a resolution was passed to accept the work of the committee and set the dates for several public hearings. The first public hearing was held on April 15th and the second hearing is set for May 20th at City Hall, 7:00 p.m. If you would like to provide comment on redistricting, you are encouraged to attend this meeting, or to contact your City Councilmember.

These maps detail the recommended changes that would move two distinct areas (outlined in red) from Ward 1 to Ward 2. If you are unsure which ward you live

EMERALD ASH BORER IN MISSION

ll ash trees native to Kansas are susceptible to infestation by the emerald ash borer, which has been confirmed in several trees in Mission. Trees become infested when adult beetles lay eggs on the bark and then hatch into larvae that bore into the tree. These damaging pests tunnel between

the bark and wood, disrupting water and nutrient movement, eventually killing the tree. The emerald ash borer appears to prefer trees that are under stress, but is also capable of killing perfectly healthy trees.

Makynze and Robert are just two of the Horizons High School students who are currently participating in the school's Community Service program.

The program — also known as Pathways to Success — matches students with businesses, where they volunteer for two hours each school day for 18 weeks. Besides getting job experience, the students earn one hour of elective credit toward graduation.

Most of the businesses participating in this program are in Mission because the students are required to walk to their jobs.

Horizons, located at Johnson Drive and Lamar, is an alternative high school program in the Shawnee Mission School District that provides credit recovery opportunities and a program for teen parents. All students who attend Horizons are behind in the credits needed for graduation and/or are teen parents. The school's focus is on helping students acquire the necessary credits to earn their diploma, as well as to assist them in planning for their career and/or further

education upon completing high school.

"I like all the people when they come through the lines," said Makynze, who is volunteering at Hy-Vee. "They are really nice."

Senior Casey Hardiman volunteered at Empire Pets Boutique last semester.

"I liked the people and the experience I got," he said. "I liked the animals and working with them.

"I wouldn't trade it (that experience) for any other class."

Plato's Closet has had two volunteers from Horizons through the Community Service program.

"We try to mentor them while they are with us, teaching them retail merchandising basics," said John Nichols, owner of the Mission Plato's Closet. "These kids really need the opportunity and, more importantly, a feeling of accomplishment and self-confidence. Business owners need to look past the stereotyping of Horizons and give these kids a real chance. They are respectful and just need someone to give them a chance and encouragement."

The school's Community Service business partners include Empire Pets Boutique, Moss Printing, Mission Pet Mart, Plato's Closet, Advance Auto Parts, Mission Hy-Vee, Kansas City Performance Diesel, Down Syndrome Guild of Greater Kansas City and Mack True Value Hardware. Horizons' job shadowing partners are Barbers IV, Signature Funerals, Mission Animal Clinic, Cigi's Makeup Studio, and Cakes and Confections by Shelly.

Molli Anderson, principal at Horizons High School, said the students treat their volunteer appointments "like a real job."

"Our ultimate goal is to provide students real-life work experience so they have credible references (when applying for jobs)," said Anderson, adding that the opportunity might give them a better idea of what they want to do for a career.

And, occasionally, students will be offered a paying job at the business where they have been volunteering.

"I tell the students that is the ultimate praise," said Laurie Hoffman, Community Service coordinator at Horizons.

Hoffman works to match the students with local businesses and then follows up to make sure everything is going well. The program usually has six to eight students each semester.

"Overwhelmingly, the response we get in so many words (from business owners) is that our kids are a lot better than they thought they would be," she said.

Aaron Barnett, associate principal at Horizons, said the school is looking for a wider variety of businesses where students can volunteer, and employers should look at this as an opportunity to "pay it forward."

"We want them to understand they are helping a student out," he said.

Meanwhile, students learn job-specific skills, time management (during their walk to and from their jobs) and how to communicate effectively. Besides references, these volunteer opportunities also give them skills they can list on a resume.

"We try to give our kids a spark of a light at the end of the tunnel, and this is a way to do it," Barnett said.

Moss Printing participates in the Community Service program each semester as a business partner.

"I think Horizons had a great idea in exposing students to real-life situations in the business world," said Jose Ramirez, owner of Moss Printing.

While volunteering at his business, the students take on tasks like filing, collating, binding and inputting data into mailing lists. They learn to answer the phone politely and assist customers and are expected to dress appropriately.

Ramirez talks to them about what they want to do after they graduate from high school and what it will take to make that happen.

"I think the more the business community invests in these



kids, we will plant seeds," he said. "...I enjoy mentoring and teaching them and showing them things they can share with their peers.

"It's an investment. You can't save them all, but you can save one at a time, right?"

In addition, Horizons recently sponsored its first career fair, giving students and vendors a chance to talk face-to-face about career and educational opportunities. About 60 students and 15 different vendors participated.

Vendors attending the career fair were representatives from Johnson County Community College (admissions/financial aid, hospitality management, cosmetology, nursing and health information technology); military recruiters (Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines); Workforce Partnership; Fort Scott Community College (motorcycle technician, diesel technician, commercial truck driver training and construction trades); Mitsu Sato Hair Academy; Centriq Training; KCTV5 News; and Pittsburg State University (automotive technology).

"It was a great opportunity for students to interview and interact with people," said Barnett, the associate principal at Horizons.

A supporter of women in the arts

At 93, Mission resident Jean Rau keeps active in the community and with the Greater Kansas City Area Committee of the National Museum of Women in the Arts

Look around Jean Rau's home and you will notice the artwork she has collected over the years: Winston Churchill and his wife over the sofa, the Frenchman reading a newspaper in the corner of her living room and a painting by her grandmother (circa the 1890s) that graces her dining room, to name a few.

For Rau, a longtime Mission resident, art has been an acquired taste that has grown over the years. She didn't have a lot of free time to appreciate art while she was raising four

children and moving every year or two around the world with her husband, a Navy pilot.

But now the 93-year-old self-proclaimed news junkie enjoys playing bridge, walking at the Sylvester Powell, Jr. Community Center (she says she tells people she walks 1 ½ miles every day but it's really only four or five days a week), and viewing art around Kansas City and wherever she travels.

Passionate about finding opportunities to promote women in the arts, Rau is a founding member of the Greater Kansas City Area Committee of the National Museum of Women in the Arts. The group is comprised of about 100 members, including businesswomen, doctors, museum docents, artists, housewives and "people like me trying to stay involved and in touch," Rau said.

The group visits and views women's artwork in the area. For seven years, Rau and her bridge friend Darlene McCluskey organized those tours. These field trips took them all over Kansas City and outlying areas to view close to 70 private collections, artists' studios and public galleries.

Helen Fisher, a former Mission resident who is an original

and current board member of the committee, said Jean and Darlene did a wonderful job organizing those outings.

"Jean is a very energetic woman," Fisher said. "I always ask her, 'Jean, what kind of vitamin pills do you take?"

The most important function of the committee, however, is its sponsorship of biennial Women to Watch art exhibits showcasing the works of local female artists. One piece from that exhibit is then displayed at the National Museum of Women in

the Arts in Washington, D.C., which can be a game changer for an artist's career.

"These accomplished women deserve to have their work seen by museum curators," Rau said. "It gives them the opportunity to show their work somewhere else besides Kansas City."

"We may have another Georgia O'Keeffe or Frida Kahlo," she added.

It's often challenging for women artists to get their artwork displayed.

According to Arzie Umali, assistant director of the UMKC Women's Center, about 22 percent of the art in Kansas City's museums was created by women compared to 13 percent nationwide.

"Women artists are still very underrepresented, but Kansas City does a better job (compared to nationally and internationally)," Rau said.

For people wanting to become more involved in the Kansas City arts community,

she suggests getting involved in groups like the Greater Kansas City Area Committee of the National Museum of Women in the Arts.







Rob and Amanda Simpson have created a colorful backyard with distinct spaces for gathering

A few "original" items remain in Rob and Amanda theme on it." Simpson's backyard. There's the tool shed, which looks more like a cute little cottage or playhouse than a protector of the lawn mower. And then there's a swing that hangs from a tall tree and the hot tub.

From those three things, the Simpsons have created a quiet, private retreat outside their home in the Countryside Homes Association.

"I feel here in Mission, located between Shawnee Mission Parkway and Johnson Drive, it is a bit of an oasis," Amanda said. "We don't hear any road noise and it is where our family spends a lot of time. It has been a great space for entertaining as well."

their first round of landscaping began in spring 2012. From there, it's been a process of figuring out what works and what doesn't and phasing things in.

The Simpsons have taken the different spots in their yard and created distinct areas or "vignettes."

"We have the hammock area, which Rob loves, the fire pit area, the dining area and then the lounging area by the hot tub (although it serves as a pool in the summertime)," Amanda said.

Around those areas are a wide array of flowers, plants, shrubs and trees. With those that flower, the Simpsons have tried to get the most "bang for their buck" with blooms that are big and bright. There are peonies (like the Eden's Perfume Peony and the Peony Gay Paree) and Globemaster The Simpsons have lived in their home since 2009, but Allium (purple flowering balls on stalks that bloom for about four weeks and look like something out of a Dr. Seuss book).

Also adding color to the Simpsons' yard via flowers and/ or foliage are the Cherokee Sunset Dogwood, Blue Atlas "The hot tub was here, so we worked around the hot Cedar, Lythrum Morden's Gleam (tall spikes of star-shaped, tub," she said. "The shed was here so we wanted to create a rose-pink flowers), Fine Line Buckthorn (fern-like foliage

that turns yellow in the fall), Coral Bells Citronelle (with lime-yellow foliage), Green Mountain Boxwood (an evergreen shrub with bright green foliage), Quick Fire Hydrangea, Sunrise Sunset Rose, assorted hostas (blue, chartreuse green, variegated white and variegated yellow), Variegated Liriope, Japanese Painted Ferns, Ghost Ferns, Goldmound Spirea, Stonecrop Neon Sedum, Blue Fescue Elijah and assorted annuals.

"I really loved mixing different shades of blues, greens and pinks/ purples in the yard," Amanda said. "... It's been fun to design and see it mature.

"I love landscaping. It's the one hobby I make time for. I love to admire other landscapes in Mission and gather ideas to incorporate into our landscaping. The use of rocks/small boulders is next on my list."

Besides being beautiful (Rosehill Gardens did the basic design with some tweaks by the Simpsons), their yard is kidfriendly. They have two children, Clara, 4 ½, and Tommy, 3. Next to the tool shed is a play area for the kids that includes a blue bench from the old Mission Pool.

"It's nice to have some of the old

pool here," she said.

The Simpsons have also tried to keep their landscaping from looking too modern since their home was built in 1940

All in all, it's a place where family and friends congregate and spend time together. People of all ages (especially adults) like hanging around the old swing; the kids enjoy pushing Rob in the hammock; and wildlife (hawks, owls and hummingbirds) have discovered the garden, too.

"Rob loves to barbecue and relax in the backyard," Amanda said. "We enjoy having neighbors over, starting a fire in the pit and enjoying the sunset and beautiful evenings in the spring and fall. We couldn't be more happy to put down roots in Mission!"




